- Fit lower wattage bulbs in multiple down lights (recessed lighting)
- Install a timer or motion sensor in dark areas (inside and outside)

Compassion Sunday – April 26th

In Mark 9:37, Jesus said, "Whoever welcomes one of these little children in my name welcomes me; and whoever welcomes me does not welcome me but the one who sent me." The Bible lays out a clear mandate for all Christians to care for children and the poor. When we do this, we are not only ministering to children but to God. In the past three years, many members of our church family have generously sponsored children through Compassion International.

During difficult economic times, we all need to be prudent with our money. When we hear statistics, such as, 27,000 children under the age of 5 die each day from preventable causes like dehydration, malaria and malnutrition, and more than 100 million children worldwide are homeless, we need to reevaluate how we spend our resources in order to help end poverty worldwide. Could we skip that cup of coffee from the convenience store on the way to work each morning or the dessert we ordered after dinner?

For \$32 a month – just about \$1 a day – you could sponsor a child, providing food, medical attention, schooling support, and Christian education through local churches in different countries.

On April 26th, you can learn more about Compassion's programs, talk to others who sponsor a child, and have the opportunity to choose a child to sponsor. If you are unable to support a child on your own, consider sponsoring a child with a group of people.

Please pray for this event and for your willingness to make a difference in the life of one child who is trapped by poverty.
