Communication with compassion

Communication with compassion is an art, not a science. There is no formula to mechanically go through the motions and then have everything work out fine but, fortunately, it can be experienced and learned.

Our Telecare Ministry Team invites persons who are interested in participating in learning about communication with compassion to attend the first 30 minutes of each monthly meeting which begins at 10:00 AM on the first Wednesday of each month in Room 1. The rest of Telecare's meeting is dedicated to reporting and learning from practicing this communication.

The approach used by Telecare for communicating with compassion is based upon four principles: attention, acknowledgement, affection and acceptance. These principles are applicable to communication in any situation. Telecare team members do not memorize things to do or not to do, but understand being with people, especially those who suffer or who may be lonely or homebound. It takes time, practice, perseverance and humility, but the result is the development of a new skill and a deeper insight into life than ever imagined.

You are invited to participate with our Telecare Ministry Team in these sessions designed basically to help participants to communicate the love of God. This promises to be an astoundingly rewarding and great learning experience applicable to all of life. You are invited to participate and learn to practice this art form.

Four "gifts" of tough financial times

On December 1st, the government finally concluded what so many of us have already suspected: our country is in a recession. So this message is about gift-getting instead of gift-giving, more specifically, gifts that are available to you during tough financial times.

GIFT OF TIME. As your family looks at fewer entertainment dollars, experience more time together as a family by playing games, baking bread (or other time intensive recipes), reading, hiking, or planning a fantasy vacation via the Internet. Most of all, talk and enjoy the company of those you love.

GIFT OF APPRECIATION. Whether you can ride out this current financial storm or you are becoming one of its victims, we can all learn to appreciate what we have. There are people nearby who aren't sure where their next basket of groceries or their children's next pair of shoes will come from. Your financial status is not permanent, so you can either look back to the good ole' days, look forward to better days, or just appreciate all that you have now. It has been better, and it will be better again.

GIFT OF PATIENCE. Remember the credit plan of the 1970s? It was called lay-away. We all have the temptation to want it now (no waiting), but this need for instant gratification comes at a price – about 24% APR on credit charges! Save for your purchase, so it belongs to you when you take it out the door. Saving is a great lesson for our children, too.

GIFT OF HEALTH. Consider the benefit of fewer high-calorie restaurant meals, more water instead of soda, less snacking between meals, smaller servings of food to stretch the groceries, or more walking to save gas. You don't need a gym membership to become more active. As those in the Walking for Wellness program have learned, 10-30 minutes of walking a day will add up quickly.

'Twas the season for giving – and you gave so much!

The leaders of the many special projects and committees who asked for your help over the past few months would like to express their sincerest and heartfelt appreciation for your generous support. The following list is a reminder of how much the congregation of EUMC reached out during the holidays to help others!

A very special thank you to:

- those who helped out with the Meeting Ground annual Thanksgiving dinner, feeding nearly 300 people!
- the many individuals and groups who helped during EUMC's week to host the rotating homeless shelter during the week of Thanksgiving. Volunteers helped with the intake process, helped with laundry and donated quarters, were evening and overnight hosts and hostesses, donated and prepared food, served meals, and donated paper products. We provided 190 bed nights and 3 meals a day for an average of 28 clients during the week. More than 400 volunteer hours were logged in order to make this week happen!
- all who knitted and crocheted scarves for the homeless – we collected 65 scarves! Of them, 28 were distributed to visitors of the rotating homeless shelter during EUMC's host week in November. The remaining scarves were donated to area shelters.
- all who donated phone cards for our troops – we collected over 13,000 minutes of phone cards this year!
- all who donated hats, scarves, mittens and other warm items for the Help Center!
- all who filled shoe boxes for boys and girls who need some care this Christmas – we filled 35 shoe boxes! Cecil County churches filled a total of 2,562 shoe boxes, which were distributed to children in 100 countries around the world.
- all who participated in the Angel Tree project and shared love with children of incarcerated parents!
- all who contributed goodies for the college care packages – the students loved them!
- all who baked cookies for the UMW cookie walk – and to all who purchased them!
- all who shopped at the Red Bird Mission craft fair – you touched many lives of those in need!
- our wonderful children who presented an equally wonderful Christmas program, and to all who attended and supported them (and, of course, everyone who helped organize the program)!
- all those who contributed so much in making our Advent/Christmas worship experiences so meaningful: musicians, worship leaders, readers, ushers, greeters, hospitality hosts, Advent wreath lighters, nativity scene helpers, those who decorated the sanctuary with the greens and the poinsettias, those who helped with communion, and those who served as parking lot attendants. We couldn't have done it without each one of you!

What is a *rebelutionist*?

"What is a rebelutionist?" It is a cross between a rebellious teen and a revolutionary. The difference is that a rebelutionist is a teen who is rebelling against the cultural trends of their own generation. They are refusing to be defined by an ungodly, rebellious culture. These teens are trying to combat teen apathy and ignorance, especially in those teens who are Christian. They wish to take a stand for teens to be responsible – to use their adolescence to grow into responsible adults. Without that, they claim that teenage apathy morphs into another stage: the kidult, a person between 18 and 25 who lives at home and waffles between jobs.

The rebelutionists are trying to build character in themselves and those around them. They believe that teens have been crippled by low expectations. They think teens need to develop character by using their teen years as a "period in which to prepare for adulthood" instead of the mind-set that the teen years are for goofing off. To quote one of these teens, "We've got to stop being brain-dead, walking around with cell phones in our ears like pacifiers."

These rebelutionists feel that we need to reach teens with compassion without compromising the truth – the truth of Jesus Christ. They feel that Christian teens today face a "deadness to spiritual things" while conforming to the world in the areas of music, movies and books. These teens believe that we need to help change hearts; we need to evangelize by speaking the gospel as Jesus would while showing the same compassion that Jesus showed – not condemning people unnecessarily but by being honest in love and expecting our Christian friends to change because they are willing to act on their beliefs and stand up for what they believe. 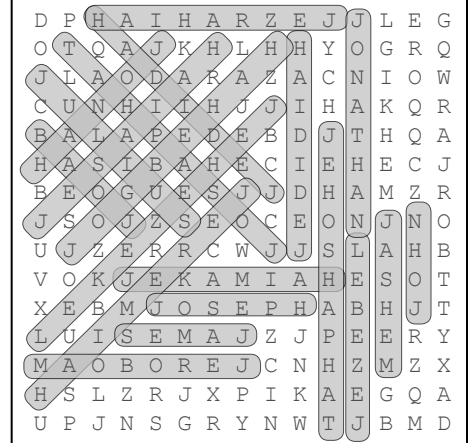
